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The issues



- · Student perceptions
- Lack of understanding of how essays are monitored
- Difficulty in understanding the difference between use of a source and copying of a source

Student perceptions



- Limited knowledge of how serious plagiarism is
- Unclear understanding of what the word
- Incomplete grasp of the different types of 'plagiarism'

Approach adopted in high school



- Some students use general web searches as opposed to reading text books, reports, articles.
- Many think that wikipedia is an acceptable source
- · Approach adopted is often 'cut and paste'
- · Few have been taught to reference

Lack of understanding of how essays are monitored



- Serious lack of understanding as to how turnitin works
- Interviews with students having a turnitin score of 20+
 - Shock at how we can tell them whose essay they have copied
 - Shock at realising that the system takes in work from all over the world

The difference between use of a source and copying of a source



- Difficulty in understanding the difference between use of a source and copying of a source
- Lack of experience/ability to précis a piece of information
- · Writing skills weak

The solution



- Development of a quiz based on the plagiarism information available to students
- Students have to undergo the quiz and gain 80% before they can submit the first essay
- · The record of undertaking this quiz is kept on file
- Draconian? So far the turnitin scores have been excellent... it works!

The Way ahead.....



- All first year students to undergo plagiarism exercise in first semester
- · Results to be kept on file
- Test to be re-taken at start of year 3
- Emphasis on importance of issue to be included in library sessions for dissertation students
